This coming Sunday is Good Shepherd Sunday. On the fourth Sunday of Easter, we always read about Jesus the Good Shepherd from John 10. Brought over from the second Sunday after Easter in the medieval one-year lectionary is the beloved Good Shepherd Sunday. Despite the popularity of the image of the lone lamb held in the shepherd's arms, most biblical use of the imagery of sheep intends a communal interpretation. Here, the flock is the focus. On Sunday the flock gathers to eat and drink together.

The next day, April 22, is Earth Day, a modern day for creation care. This has always been a Christian concern, for God's instruction to Adam in the Garden of Eden was to tend the land.

Emmanuel follows ancient Christian practice of praying for fields, planting, and agriculture in the spring. Rogation Days were traditionally celebrated during the fifty days of Easter on the Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday before Ascension Day. The word Rogation has its roots in the Latin word that means to ask or petition, and it comes from the opening prayer for the Sunday preceding the Ascension. In some places the celebrations of Rogation Days included elaborate processions from the church to and around fields while asking for God's blessing.

Abundant God, we give you thanks for the fruitful earth, which produces what is needed for life. Bless those who work in the fields; grant favorable weather to all engaged in agriculture; and help us to ensure that all people share the fruits of the earth, rejoicing in your goodness; through your Son, Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**



CREATION CARE CORNER – From Church in Society Committee of the SWPA Synod WAYS TO HONOR EARTH DAY

- 1. Take a hike. Even the little ones can participate.
- 2. Make it Meatless Mondays in your home. Try for a month, you'll like it!
- 3. Plan or join a local clean-up.
- 4. Plant a pollinator garden. To start, research specific local plants that pollinators are typically attracted to like milkweed, coneflowers, and goldenrod. A project sure to delight you and the bees and butterflies.
- 5. Plant a tree, the classic Earth Day activity! Whether in your yard or donating to a tree planting project like the Nature Conservancy's Plant a Billion Tree campaign.
- 6. Switch to natural products in home and garden. Eco-friendly and healthier.
- 7. Start composting. Less trash and great for your garden.
- 8. Brainstorm ways to reuse, reduce, rethink, recycle, and make a real effort to avoid single use plastics.
- 9. Turn out lights. The best saving of energy is the energy we don't use!
- 10. Talk about your concerns about global warming and the steps you are taking to combat climate change. Tell everyone the money your solar panels are saving you, offer a ride in your electric car and sing its praises for local driving, by example keep your commitment to carrying your own refillable water bottle, your efforts to work for climate solutions and your support of legislators who do too.

BOOK RECOMMENDATION: Braiding Sweetgrass by Robin Wall Kimmerer. In this beautifully written book by a botanist and member of the Citizen Potawatomi Nation, the author shares indigenous wisdom, scientific knowledge, and the teaching of plants. These stories give new appreciation of all of God's creation, exploring the connection between living things and human efforts to cultivate a more sustainable world.
