Living the Easter Life

Almighty God, with joy we celebrate the day of our Lord's resurrection. By the grace of Christ among us, enable us to show the power of the resurrection in all that we say and do, through Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.

The church keeps Easter for eight Sundays. The fifty days culminates at Pentecost.

Early Christians referred to Sunday as the eighth day, as if the normal week of seven is miraculously completed in an extraordinary eighth day. Genesis 1 describes the work of creation in six days. God rests on the seventh day. With the resurrection of Jesus, God is doing a new thing: It is the eighth day. Early Christians began gathering for worship and mutual support on the Day of Resurrection, the "eighth day." Each Sunday, individually and communally, we meet the risen Christ in word and sacrament, and in sharing God's peace with one another.

This past Sunday, the Festival of the Resurrection, was full of life and joy at Emmanuel. We sang with gusto. We rang bells as we rejoiced with Alleluias. We heard the Gospel in English and Spanish. We renewed our faith and Easter life by renewing our Baptism vows. We enjoyed new sound equipment. We moved from the sad days of Jesus' suffering love for us to the happy day of Jesus' resurrection. We rejoiced that in our baptism, resurrection is for us, too.

3 Do you not know that all of us who have been baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? 4 Therefore we have been buried with him by baptism into death, so that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, so we too might walk in newness of life. Community Easter Egg Hunt, Saturday, March 30


Between 25 and 30 children came with parents and friends. The rain stopped in time to hide and hunt eggs. Some of the volunteers and parents were egg hunters as children.


