Why is Holy Week important?

Holy Week is a pilgrimage in time. We pause each day to remember and worship. If we could go to the Holy Land, we would go to the places where these events took place. St. Paul writes in 1 Corinthians 15: For I handed on to you as of first importance what I in turn had received: that Christ died for our sins in accordance with the scriptures ⁴ and that he was buried and that he was raised on the third day in accordance with the scriptures. Holy Week is important because Jesus' death is important!!

Maundy Thursday

7 pm - Worship with Holy Communion

Jesus gives the great commandment to Love One Another As I Have Loved You. Jesus gave us the sacrament of Holy Communion that night. Then he washed their feet. *This year our service includes washing of feet*. You are invited but not required to have your feet washed... We conclude with Psalm 22 as everything is removed from the altar symbolizing how Jesus was arrested, stripped, and led to the cross.

Good Friday

12 - 3 pm - Prayer and Meditation in the Emmanuel sanctuary

We mark the three hours Jesus hung on the cross. Come for all or a portion of that time.

7 pm - The Cross

We continue worship by retelling the crucifixion according to St. John. We adore the cross on which was hung the salvation of the whole world!!

Holy Saturday

7 pm Easter Vigil at First Lutheran Church, Pittsburgh

This is the least known but oldest Holy Week worship. We move from death to life, from waiting to the joy of resurrection. The service includes renewal of baptismal vows and concludes with great joy. *We carpool from Emmanuel at 6:15 pm.*
